Major public and private investment continues to add to the capability of the region, bringing capital city infrastructure to a much loved and envied lifestyle region.





### Maroochydore City Centre

Maroochydore City Centre is Australia's newest greenfield CBD and aims to be Australia's first truly smart city, just 15 minutes from the Sunshine Coast Airport and 20 milliseconds from Asia via the new broadband submarine cable.

Master-planned from the ground up, the new Maroochydore City Centre will offer capital city infrastructure and has been designed for the Sunshine Coast lifestyle, with almost 18 hectares of parklands and waterways. The multi-billion-dollar greenfield CBD will feature a mix of commercial, retail, residential and dining precincts.

In preparation for the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games and part of the Queensland Government's 2032 Delivery Plan, Maroochydore City Centre will be transformed with a new integrated Athlete Village, arena venue and cultural precinct.

The Queensland Government approved Priority Development Area is being delivered by Walker Corporation, SunCentral Maroochydore and Sunshine Coast Council.

#### Feeding the data hungry

As of 2020 the Sunshine Coast is home to an 18 Tbps submarine data cable providing the fastest east coast connection from Australia to Asia.

Further strengthening the region's digital infrastructure, a new Google undersea cable is set to enhance connectivity, ensuring even greater data capacity and network resilience.

Data hungry businesses of all sizes can benefit from faster data speeds, reduced risk and lower costs.

The Sunshine Coast is also placed at the forefront of the cyber security sector with the establishment of a new national organisation aimed at protecting the nation against cyber criminals.

The Critical Infrastructure - Information Sharing and Analysis Centre (CI-ISAC) is a not-for-profit industry-based organisation which provides comprehensive information analysis advice to assist its membership base to protect Australia's most critical infrastructure.



In late 2021, ASX-listed NEXTDC purchased the Sunshine Coast International Broadband Cable Landing Station from Sunshine Coast Council to create NEXTDC SC1 Tier 3N+1 Edge Data Centre. Located in the heart of Maroochydore, the data centre provides a direct link to high-speed data via the Sunshine Coast's international submarine cable.

With a total planned capacity of 1MW, SC1 supports the highest levels of customer availability and is backed by a service guarantee of 100% uptime.

NEXTDC's national digital infrastructure platform is also home to the largest network of public cloud access points (cloud onramps) across all cloud platforms, which SC1 connects directly to via NEXTDC's AXON Interconnection platform.

To support backhaul requirements from B1 and B2 Brisbane to JGA-S submarine cable, QCN Fibre has 'lit' up 35 Terabytes per second of diverse telecommunications capacity.

### Sunshine Coast Health Precinct

The development of the Sunshine Coast Health Precinct will contribute \$3.2 billion to the Sunshine Coast economy and \$447 million each year after completion.

The precinct is anchored by the Sunshine Coast University Hospital, Sunshine Coast Health Institute and Sunshine Coast University Private Hospital and incorporates the adjacent Health Hub and surrounding Birtinya Town Centre offering prime investment opportunities.

The Sunshine Coast University Hospital is a tertiary, teaching hospital and together with the Sunshine Coast Health Institute, boasts world-class research facilities and advanced medical training.

If your health business is looking for opportunities to grow, there are billions of reasons why the Sunshine Coast is a wise choice for health industry businesses, innovators and entrepreneurs.

#### **HEALTH HUB**

The 17 hectare Health Hub is a greenfield health and medical precinct offering a strategic opportunity to be located next to two university hospitals and an emerging town centre.

### Public transport project

Sunshine Coast Council is planning for the future to maintain the lifestyle and environment of the Sunshine Coast as the population is projected to increase by around 200,000 people between 2016 and 2041.

To support this growth, sustainable transport options are needed, particularly in the coastal corridor between Maroochydore and Caloundra.

A major new transport initiative is planned for the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. 'The Wave' will transform regional travel by creating a direct rail connection from Beerwah to Birtinya, linking seamlessly to a metro hub in Maroochydore that connects passengers directly to the Sunshine Coast Airport. This modern transport network will not only support the influx of visitors during the Games but will also provide long-term benefits by reducing congestion and promoting efficient, environmentally-friendly travel throughout the region.

The system will support the \$2.7 billion tourism industry by connecting key centres and attractions. The mass transit system aims is set to transform regional mobility. It will reduce car reliance, connect key centres, provide inclusive transport, support local trips, be environmentally friendly and promote vibrant, walkable neighbourhoods.

### Sunshine Coast Airport Master Plan

The Sunshine Coast Airport's international runway has elevated the facility to a world-class, fully-serviced aviation precinct.

The expanded airport provides a direct gateway to the region and to a greater range of locations in Australia, Asia and other international destinations.

Further development, to be delivered under the Airport Masterplan, will provide exciting and diverse opportunities in the Australasian aviation market.

In September 2024 the Sunshine Coast Airport Priority Development Area Development Scheme came into effect following a period of public consultation.

The Development Scheme will help create a world-class airport precinct that connects the local community, welcomes visitors and unlocks opportunities to attract investment, drive economic growth and create jobs in a range of sectors.

The expanding precinct will provide prime airside and landside development opportunities for smart and innovative businesses.

# Demand for hotel development

Sunshine Coast Council has launched a package of incentives as part of its strategy to attract qualified hotel developers, investors and owners.

The opportunity to share in the prosperous future of the region has never been better. This prospectus outlines the possibilities and new opportunities the Sunshine Coast has to offer to potential hotel investors, developers and owners.

However, current hotel supply is unable to satisfy demand. The research shows the demand is especially for new internationally-branded hotels.


The combination of a rapidly growing local population, strong economic growth and infrastructure investment provides a solid platform for a prosperous and exciting future for the region.

The Sunshine Coast has been bolstered by \$19.5 billion in region-shaping projects, is a beneficiary of the South East Queensland \$1.3 billion City Deal and will be an important Co-Host City for the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. As a result, there are distinct hotel market opportunities.

The region needs more hotel rooms to support the visitor economy across leisure, business, MICE (meetings, incentives, conferences and exhibitions), health, education and VFR (visiting family and relatives) travellers.

A steady entry of new hotel rooms across key commercial and leisure precincts is required to meet the growth of both domestic and international visitors to the region.

#### Demand profile



The research demonstrates the need to attract up to 2450 newly built internationally branded and operated hotel rooms across nine properties, between now and the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

This figure includes the need for 300 boutique hotel rooms across six properties.

Opportunities exist for operators with a proven track record of building high quality, internationally-branded and operate \$50 million.

The Sunshine Coast continues to record year-on-year growth in visitation and has recently posted some of the highest ADRs (average daily rates) in Australia. <sup>1</sup>

For the 12 months to 30 September 2024, the region attracted \$4.3 billion in overnight visitor expenditure, an increase of 42.8% since December 2019. <sup>2</sup>

The delivery of quality, internationally-branded hotels as an integral part of these precincts is required to meet the expectations of a diverse cross-section of modern travellers.

The opportunity to share in this prosperous future by investing in new, internationally-branded hotels has never been better.

#### Undersupply driving demand

A recent investigation by independent consultant Tourism and Hospitality Services Australia (THSA) into commercial visitor accommodation on the Sunshine Coast estimates that up to 2150 new internationally branded and operated hotel rooms and a further 300 boutique hotel rooms are required to service the needs of the region's growing overnight visitor economy.

The Sunshine Coast has approximately 3590 rooms available across 10 hotels, four boutique hotels, 14 motels and 57 serviced apartments.

More than 70% of the existing market is dedicated to providing self-catering accommodation which is not typically favoured by the business, health and education visitor markets.

Only 34% of all rooms are affiliated with a hotel brand, compared with 62% nationally.

This lack of branded hotel rooms leaves the region significantly undersupplied to meet the needs of a growing overnight visitor economy. The visitor economy generated 15 million visitor nights in the year ending September 2024, which is an increase of 1.7% on the previous year. 2

Further, it is estimated that the number of visitor nights will increase to 12.50 million by 2033.

The relative lack of suitable visitor accommodation is suppressing a higher conversion rate of day visitors into overnight visitors.

Sunshine Coast Council is taking the next step in cementing the region's position on the global map. The development of internationally-branded hotels plays an essential part in achieving this position.

#### A strategic location

The Sunshine Coast is located 100 kilometres north of Brisbane and forms part of the wider South East Queensland region. The Sunshine Coast has an international airport, is easy to access and navigate and has a new public transport solution in planning, ahead of the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

#### Air

Sunshine Coast Airport (MCY) is centrally located just 15 minutes from Maroochydore City Centre, making it an easy commute for business travellers. The airport is serviced by Qantas, Jetstar, Virgin Australia and Air New Zealand.

Sunshine Coast Airport celebrated a record breaking 1.85 million passengers in 2023 and a record January 2024, with more than 180,000 passengers passing through the terminal.

These incredible figures follow Sunshine Coast Council's investment of \$334 million in the construction of an award-winning new international runway, completed in June 2020.

The airport is a thriving gateway, becoming one of the fastest-growing airports in Australia, forecast to facilitate more than 2.1 million passengers by 2026, 2.6 million by 2030 and 3.5 million by 2040, representing a significant increase in visitation to the region.<sup>3</sup>

#### Road

The Bruce Highway (M1) acts as the spine through the region, connecting it with Brisbane and Moreton Bay to the south, Noosa and Gympie to the north and the hinterland to the west. The Sunshine Motorway and David Low Way connect Noosa with the towns and villages along the coastal corridor.

The region has benefitted (and continues to benefit) from multi-billion dollar State Government investment including an upgrade of the Bruce Highway from Caloundra Road to the Sunshine Motorway (completed in July 2021) and the Maroochydore Road and Mons Road interchange (completed in June 2023). A planned future upgrade will widen the Bruce Highway to six lanes (three in each direction) between the Sunshine Motorway and Maroochydore Road.<sup>4</sup>






Intrastate visitors make up 72% of all domestic visitor nights.

#### Performance commentary

The Sunshine Coast continued to rebound following subdued visitation due to the COVID-19 pandemic. By the end of September 2024 the region had recorded more than 4.19 million domestic overnight visitors, with a record 15,054,000 nights booked, making the Sunshine Coast the second most visited region in Queensland.

The most recent Tourism Research Australia results also show that for the year ending September 2024, visitors to the Sunshine Coast generated a total overnight visitor expenditure of \$4.3 billion.<sup>2</sup>

# Future demand and opportunities

The Sunshine Coast will require 2150 new internationally branded and operated hotel rooms across nine properties and a further 300 boutique hotel rooms across six properties to meet forecasted demand between now and the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

While there are clear and distinct opportunities to develop hotels that are more oriented to either the business or leisure markets, from a commercial sustainability perspective, the preference is for hotel operators to attract demand from a diverse range of visitor segments.

Business visitors to the Sunshine Coast help to diversify the market mix away from leisure travellers. This higher spending cohort generates year-round demand and helps to boost mid-week occupancy. Business travellers expand revenue streams through MICE and are often repeat visitors who promote the destination or return as leisure visitors.

The existing limited supply of suitable corporateoriented hotel accommodation is a significant limitation for the overnight business visitor market. A shortage of large-scale upper upscale and luxury conference hotels limits the size and calibre of events the region can attract.

Opportunities exist for full-service, internationally branded hotels featuring business-friendly amenities such as meeting rooms, high-speed internet and 24 hour business centres.

- → Ongoing delivery of Sippy Downs Town Centre Precinct.
- → Strong support to fast-track the development of Sunshine Coast Exhibition & Convention Centre in Maroochydore's City Centre.

### Investment opportunities -Leisure and VFR visitor markets

Leisure visitors are significant generators of direct and indirect economic impact through spending on accommodation, dining, transport, attractions and retail. Internationally branded and managed hotels also have an important part to play in bidding, securing and hosting large, multi-day events.

The region currently offers few full-service hotels to satisfy overnight visitors seeking a hotel (as opposed to a self-catering apartment) experience. A lack of wedding and event venues limits opportunities to attract the VFR market while there are limited luxury and upper upscale hotels to meet the needs of the high-value traveller (HVT) market.

#### Hotel opportunities

- → Capitalise on the recent expansion of aviation routes at Sunshine Coast Airport.
- → Hotels with sizeable function, event and wedding facilities or destination wedding hotels.

#### Key demand drivers

- → Ongoing investment in new tourism products and experiences.
- → Strong regional population growth.
- → The growing popularity of boutique, lifestyle and affordable luxury hotels.
- → Ongoing delivery of the Sunshine Coast Major Events Strategy 2018-2028 (2023 refresh) will continue to strengthen the region's reputation as a sports event destination.
- → Council also encourages major events to be held during off-peak periods to create consistent visitation.
- → Award winning destination marketing managed by Visit Sunshine Coast with Sunshine Coast Council support.
- → The Maroochydore City Centre will be transformed with new sports infrastructure, including a new integrated Athlete Village, arena and cultural precinct.
- → The development of new sports infrastructure ahead of the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games will enable the region to diversify its sports offering.
- → Ongoing delivery of the Caloundra Town Centre Revitalisation Plan.

Education visitors typically stay for extended periods, allowing them to explore the area, engage in tourism activity and contribute to the local economy. Accommodation located near universities, colleges or research centres is more convenient for educational tourists.

There are currently no hotels within an easy walk of University of Sunshine Coast (UniSC) to capture education-related demand. Minimum night stay requirements, especially during the peak season while some students are still in class, are often cost-prohibitive and accommodation not readily available.

Many education tourists are students or researchers on a tight budget who require affordable accommodation such as economy and mid-scale hotels, extended stay options and fully furnished rooms.

#### Key demand drivers

- → The region is home to 83,000 students across UniSC, two TAFE campuses and more than 400 RTOs.<sup>6</sup>
- → Demand for education industry services by Sunshine Coast residents is predicted to grow by up to 50% between 2013 and 2033.
- Increased interest in national and international education-related conferences and seminars as the education sector grows.
- → Growing international audience with need for more hotels to satisfy VFR travellers.

Health tourists are typically high-yielding as they spend significantly on medical treatments, accommodation, transport and other related services. They often require longer stays for medical procedures and recovery which can lead to higher occupancy rates.

Investment opportunities -Health and medical visitor

With the exception of the 81-room Mercure hotel at Kawana Waters, there is no full-service visitor accommodation within easy access to the Sunshine Coast's hospitals and large medical facilities. Many self-catering apartments lack the accessibility requirements needed for travellers with mobility challenges.

The primary consideration for medical tourists is proximity to the medical facilities where they are receiving treatment.

#### Hotel opportunities

#### Key demand drivers

- → Established academic credentials supported by UniSC, Sunshine Coast Health Institute and UniSC Thompson Institute.
- → The opening of Maroochydore Private Hospital will further cement the region's presence in healthcare, research and innovation.
- → Continued growth in the healthcare sector, already the region's largest employer.
- → Hotel accommodation leveraging increased activity around the Maroochydore Private Hospital (currently under construction) which will accommodate medical and teaching staff and be a centre for surgical research and innovation.

- → Pre and post-operative outpatients and their carers
- → Visiting doctors, specialists and medical suppliers
- → Medical-related meetings, training seminars and conferences

#### Key drivers of demand

#### Leisure

The majority of Sunshine Coast visitors are holidaymakers. The domestic overnight holiday visitor market has acheived a 13.1% increase in the past three years and a 17% increase compared to December 2019. There were 2.58 million domestic overnight holiday visitors for the year ending September 2024.<sup>2</sup>

Sunshine Coast is a product and experience-rich region. Ongoing investment in new tourism products and experiences provides new reasons to visit and helps to stimulate repeat visitation.

A new international runway and increased routes at Sunshine Coast Airport will see increased visitation from new domestic and international markets.

#### VFR (visiting friends and relatives)

The anticipated growth in population over the next 20 years means the VFR sector will continue to be an important generator of visitation to the region. The domestic overnight VFR market has achieved a 8.4% increase in visitors over the past three years, with 1.27 million domestic overnight VFR visitors for the year ending September 2024.<sup>2</sup>

A rapidly increasing population has the potential to fuel demand for social functions like private events and weddings, presenting opportunities to stimulate overnight accommodation.

#### Events and festivals

The Sunshine Coast has well-established credentials in hosting a diverse events and festivals calendar. Iconic and popular events such as Horizon Festival, The Curated Plate food festival and a multitude of sporting events are attracting national and international audiences.

The development of internationally-branded and operated hotels will have an important part to play in bidding for, securing and hosting large-scale, festival-style events.

#### **Business**

The Sunshine Coast market is one of the more competitively priced office markets in Australia, with net face rents and capital values one of the most affordable on the east coast.

Demand for hotel accommodation is expected to intensify in existing and expanding commercial hubs (Maroochydore, Caloundra, Sippy Downs) and business, industrial, education and health-related precincts.

The strong level of pent-up demand for suitably corporate-oriented hotel accommodation from the day business visitor market is a strong market opportunity, as is the opportunity to stimulate demand from the business events market.

### MICE (meetings, incentives, conferences and exhibitions)

The current conference venue infrastructure within the region presents limitations on the potential size of events, as does the lack of luxury, upper upscale, internationally-branded hotels to accommodate delegates.

Additionally, the high proportion of self-catering accommodation (approximately 65% of all commercial rooms) is a limitation when attracting sizeable, high-calibre events.

Business Events Sunshine Coast reportedly loses MICE market business to other destinations due to these limitations and high pricing driven by demand for minimum stays.

The development of high quality, internationally-branded hotels with sizeable conference and event space provides significant potential to attract pentup demand for MICE-related business.





#### Sports tourism

The Sunshine Coast regularly hosts several major events and competitions including The Aussies (Australian Surf Life Saving Championships), Ironman 70.3 Sunshine Coast, Mooloolaba Triathlon, NRL qualifying finals and Women's State of Origin.

The combination of the region's high-quality sports facilities and accessibility to more than four million people residing within a two-hour drive makes it a popular destination for sports events of all kinds.

The University of the Sunshine Coast is Australia's only university accredited by the Australian Institute of Sport. The Sports Hub Sunshine Coast offers a range of high-performance sports, training and allied health services.

The Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games will see the Sunshine Coast take an active role as Co-Host City with events across multiple venues. Maroochydore City Centre will be transformed with a new integrated Athlete Village, arena and cultural precinct.

Other proposed venue improvements include a major expansion of the Sunshine Coast Stadium and a significant upgrade to the Sunshine Coast Mountain Bike Centre.

The Stadium is a well-established venue for rectangular sports and will be expanded from 1046 to 10,680 permanent seats so it can better host major sporting, recreational and entertainment events.

The Stadium upgrade will support growing demand for a high calibre sporting venue on the Sunshine Coast, bolstering its use case for community and sporting organisations, including the NRL.

Meanwhile, the upgraded Mountain Bike Centre will enhance facilities and trails, meeting growing demand for nature-based recreation. It will also drive increased tourism and training opportunities across the region.

Sports tourism generates significant accommodation demand from diverse audiences, from school groups to elite and professional athletes.

The lack of suitably scaled and internationallybranded hotel accommodation means the region is losing opportunities to bid for large-scale events.

#### Health Precinct

The health industry is the Sunshine Coast's largest employer and the region has seen significant investment in a major health precinct over the last decade.

Potential exists to generate room night demand from a variety of health-related segments.

- → Pre and post-op outpatients (and their carers)
- → Visiting doctors, specialists and medical suppliers
- → Medical-related meetings, training seminars and conferences

A new \$100 million surgical and teaching hospital in the Maroochydore CBD, has the potential to generate further health and education-related demand. Construction began on the Maroochy Private Hospital in September 2023 and is expected to open its doors in the first quarter of 2026.

#### Education

The University of the Sunshine Coast is one of Australia's fastest growing universities, with around 12,330 students enrolled across its Sippy Down campus, Sunshine Coast Health Institute and USC Thompson Institute.

In 2019 Griffith University's School of Medicine and Dentistry established a Doctor of Medicine program at the Sunshine Coast Health Institute.

Collectively, these institutions and the ongoing investment in tertiary education across the region will stimulate demand for overnight accommodation from:

- → Prospective students
- → VFR of enrolled students
- → Visiting lecturers and professors
- → Education-related conferences and seminars



### Impact of the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games

The Sunshine Coast proudly stands as a Co-Host City for the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The region is set to host nine premier events and will feature a newly developed, 1,400-bed Athlete Village in a transformed Maroochydore City Centre - a vibrant precinct that will integrate athlete accommodation, an arena and cultural facilities, ensuring a lasting legacy beyond the Games.

While most spectators at any Olympic Games are domestic, it is assumed by host nations that there will be a substantial influx of international and corporate incentive visitors and that these visitors will saturate the hotel market for the 18 nights of the event.

The Olympic Games competition will showcase a diverse range of events - including marathon, race walk, road and mountain bike cycling, kiteboarding, football and basketball - while also hosting the Paralympic marathon and cycling events. These competitions will provide a global stage to highlight the Sunshine Coast's rich tourism experiences, from its stunning coastal landscapes to its dynamic cultural offerings.

Development of new hotels will support the region's growing sports tourism industry to meet current and future anticipated demand from all sports events, in addition to the 8-10 week Olympic event.

#### Direct Olympic visitors

Accommodation demand will be drawn from a large number of people who are directly involved with the Olympic Games. While athletes and team officials will mainly be accommodated at the Olympic Village, other participants needing accommodation may include sponsors, guests of sponsors, media and relatives of participants.

- → These visitors are reasonably constant in their attendance regardless of where the Games are held and stay for the entire duration.
- → The total size of this Olympic family is estimated to be between 55,000 and 70,000 visitors.
- → The accommodation requirement will be up to 1 million nights evenly distributed over the 18-night event, with approximately 40,000 to 60,000 rooms per night.
- → In addition to the Games schedule, there is also a requirement for room nights pre and post-Olympics.
- → Largely corporate in behaviour, direct visitors exhibit a high preference for internationally branded and operated full-service hotels, mainly occupy single rooms and require various standards of accommodation (eg. midscale through to luxury hotels).

#### Indirect Olympic Games visitors

Indirect visitors include domestic and international visitors who watch the Games as spectators. This includes international visitors who come to spectate a particular sport, patriots who come to support their national athletes and Olympic enthusiasts who come to experience the Games.

While the total numbers fluctuate from day to day and from city to city depending on the schedule, their total number is expected to be nearly double those of the "Olympic community".

#### **GAMES DEMAND**

Research shows that to accommodate just 5% of the total number of rooms required by the Olympic Community (49,920 rooms), an additional 1155 internationally branded and operated rooms are needed.







### Never a better time

The Sunshine Coast boasts one of Australia's leading regional economies, having almost doubled its gross regional product during the last decade to \$23.73 billion.

The region's population is estimated to increase by nearly 3% annually to 2041 to reach over 500,000.

#### Greenfield CBD

Foundation Place, the CBD's first commercial office development, was officially opened in 2020, followed by the 10-storey Sunshine Coast City Hall in 2022 and the 5-storey A1 commercial building in 2023.

When complete in 2035, the CBD will become the major service centre for a population catchment of more than 1.5 million people, home to more than 15,000 permanent jobs and inject more than \$4.4 billion into the local economy.

In addition, the 2032 Delivery Plan will see the Maroochydore CBD transformed with an integrated Athlete Village, arena and cultural precinct - further energising the region and establishing a dynamic hub for sports, culture and community connection.

#### Diversified economy

The region's \$23.73 billion economy is growing at three times the average annual rate of Australia's, showing increased diversification of the region's economic base. Strong year-on-year economic growth is also evident with with an average increase of 5.7% from 2020 to 2023, compared to Australia's growth of 2.3% for the same period.

#### Public transport project

The Sunshine Coast public transport project aims to provide a sleek and modern rapid transit system as the backbone of the region's future public transport network and connect the region's key leisure, business, health and education hubs.

As a centerpiece of this initiative, 'The Wave' will introduce a direct rail link from Beerwah to Birtinya, seamlessly integrating a metro hub that connects to the Sunshine Coast Airport through Maroochydore - further enhancing regional connectivity.

#### A highly accoladed destination

The Sunshine Coast was announced as the third most loved destination on the planet, according to the 2023 Tourism Sentiment Index.

#### Airport masterplan

An international runway was completed at the Sunshine Coast Airport in July 2020. A project to double the size of the airport terminal and improve passenger experience is expected to begin in 2024 and is due for completion in early 2027.

Future investment will be guided by the Sunshine Coast Airport Master Plan 2040, a blueprint to shape the future of the airport to meet the needs of a thriving region.



#### New tourism products

Existing, planned and proposed million-dollar investments in new visitor attractions, products and experiences will continue to stimulate visitation, visitor spend and demand for overnight accommodation.

Examples include Surf Parks Australia, Palmview Cultural Ecovillage, Pelican Waters Marina, Australia Zoo and Crocodile Hunter Lodge, and Aussie World.

Additionally, the Horizon Festival stands out as a flagship event, showcasing the region's vibrant arts and culture scene to attract visitors both nationally and internationally.

#### Place enhancement

Multi-million-dollar investment in streetscape beautification, placemaking and revitalisation of existing precincts will elevate visitor experiences and create vibrancy and sustainable commercial opportunities.

### Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games

The Sunshine Coast will play a key role in the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games which will raise the profile of the region on the global visitor map.

Maximising this opportunity, however, will necessitate the development of more internationally-branded hotels both during and after the Games.



#### SUNSHINE COAST AIRPORT

Sunshine Coast Airport Master Plan provides prime airside and landside development opportunities for smart and innovative aviation businesses and related facilities.

The airport's international runway has elevated the facility to a world-class, fully-serviced aviation precinct.

The expanded airport is providing more ways for businesses to thrive, such as:

- → Increased domestic and international routes
- → Prime airside and landside development opportunities
- → New freight facilities for Sunshine Coast agribusinesses and producers

#### CALOUNDRA AERODROME

The newly established Caloundra Aerospace Park - a 6.3 hectare precinct within the aerodrome - serves as a dynamic hub in South East Queensland's aviation network. The Maroochy Private Hospital is a \$100 million development in Maroochydore's greenfield CBD, offering multiple surgical specialties and multidisciplinary healthcare services.

It will feature six operating theatres and luxurious inpatient accommodation, and has acquired a 4-star green certification integrating sustainable design elements, aligning with the Sunshine Coast's vision for sustainability.

We commit to working in partnership with the Traditional Custodians and the broader First Nations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) communities to support self-determination through economic and community development.

Truth telling is a significant part of our journey. We are committed to better understanding the collective histories of the Sunshine Coast and the experiences of First Nations peoples. Legacy issues resulting from colonisation are still experienced by Traditional Custodians and First Nations people.

We recognise our shared history and will continue to work in partnership to provide a foundation for building a shared future with the Kabi Kabi and the Jinibara peoples.

#### PLACE OF THE BLACK SWAN

The first inhabitants of the Maroochy district of the region were the Aboriginal people of the Kabi Kabi peoples, whose lands stretched from Burrum River in the north, to Pine River in the south and west to the Conondale Ranges.

For over 20,000 years, the Kabi Kabi people lived in the surrounding ranges, fished the rivers and gathered seafood from the ocean

Mooroo-kutchi \*meaning red-bill, the name of the black swan Moorookutchi-dha \*meaning the place of the black swan Maroochy and Maroochydore are place names derived from the Yaggera (Brisbane River) language group.

The names were recorded by Andrew Petrie, during a trip to the coast in 1842

Petrie obtained the names from two Brisbane River First Nations men who were travelling with him. The local name for the swan is Kuluin. The name Maroochydore came into general use in 1884.

The Sunshine Coast has a full range of high quality education and training facilities including the University of the Sunshine Coast, a multicampus vocational education and training institute (TAFE Queensland), over 400 Registered Training Organisations, English Language colleges and more than 80 private and public schools.

Approximately 98% of year 12 school leavers graduate with a Queensland Certificate of Education, vocational education and training qualification or International Baccalaureate Diploma.

The University of the Sunshine Coast (UniSC) is one of Australia's fastest growing universities and offers more than 120 undergraduate and postgraduate study programs.

UniSC actively partners with local industries and businesses to provide important links between students and the workforce.

It also partners with local high schools to prepare students for university.

The Sunshine Coast Health Institute is a partnership between Griffith University, UniSC, TAFE Queensland and the Sunshine Coast Hospital and Health Service.

This important venture allows Griffith University medical students to study in the environment they will work in, collaborating with various health industry professionals.


